# Planning Steps: Working with Ages 6-11

Children in this age group are growing into their personalities and learning styles. Children's ministry leaders have the joy of watching these personalities develop, and the challenge of leading a program that engages all varieties of learning styles. Read through the following list of Learning Styles, keeping yourself and your kids in mind.

### Linguistic

Good At: Writing, Verbal Expression, Nuance of Meaning Enjoys: Words, Reading, Storytelling, Writing Learns By: Reciting, Hearing, Reading, Following written instructions

Teacher's Tip: Write it down, Have them recite, Mean what you say (e.g. sarcasm)

# Logical

Good At: Problem-solving, Math, Reasoning Enjoys: Patterns, Numbers, Relationships Teacher's Tip: Acknowledge right or wrong answers Don't discourage students from "pigeon-holing" some concepts or people (they are probably not being prejudiced, just needing to fit the information into a category)

# Musical

Good At: Musical memory, Making and manipulating sound Enjoys: Sounds, Rhythm, Melody, Singing Teacher's Tip: Channel sound-making to the benefit of the lesson, Have them create tunes, Allow variations to the "norm"

# Visual / Spatial

Good At: Mapping, Charting, Sculpting, Modelling Enjoys: Drawing, Building, Designing, Visualizing Teacher's Tip: Visual Aids, Use colour to differentiate, Use Objects, Don't rely totally on words Children in this age range are developing their problem-solving and cause/effect skills. Make sure that your lessons and activities engage their curious minds. Here are some tips:

1. Ask 'what would happen if...?' questions

2. Challenge them to explain their opinions

3. Ask 'would you rather...?' questions

4. Challenge them to predict the outcome of stories

5. Challenge them to judge between multiple choices in moral issues

6. Challenge them to predict and explain motive in stories or moral issues

7. Challenge them to predict the impact of their actions (on themselves and others)

8. Challenge them to dissect a story or situation into its cause and effect components

MY NOTES:

#### Tactile / Kinaesthetic

Good At: Hand-eye coordination, Movement, Physical Expression, Sports Enjoys: Moving, Handling, Touching Teacher's Tip: Channel movement, Provide texture or objects to touch, Impromptu skits, Don't require them to sit still all through class

#### Extroverted

Good At: Empathizing, Leading, Communicating, Negotiating Enjoys: Interacting, Talking, Teams, Imagining Another's Feelings Teacher's Tips: Allow time for discussion and interaction, Mentor leadership skills, Be a good example, "Share & Tell", Don't yell at the whole class

#### Introverted

Good At: Self-analysis, Introspection, Application, Feelings Enjoys: Working alone, Quietness, Independent work Teacher's Tip: Give attention to the introverts, so the extroverts don't dominate the program, Monitor Noise, Give choices between group and individual work, Give them time to process information
