From the Bishop

Dear ACW friends in Christ,

The hottest of summers is turning into an equally warm autumn and I hope that over the last few months you have enjoyed the beauty of creation and good times with your loved ones.

I would like to thank you once again for your tremendous outpouring of support for our youth and youth leaders to attend CLAY 2018. I have written about my experience of CLAY (Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth) 2018 in the October edition of the Algoma Anglican, but wanted to share a little more with you.

It is a biennial gathering which brings youth together from across the country. This year it took place on the campus of Lakehead University, Thunder Bay, and featured large group gatherings, shared worship, live entertainment, and opportunities for the youth to participate in the powerful Blanket Exercise, and an exercise about homelessness. Steve Greene, presently serving in the Diocese of Huron, was the 'story-weaver' throughout the four day event and pulled together the narratives of each storyteller who spoke to their experiences in ministry and embodying God's call in their lives. The storytellers shared stories of pain and hurt, but also of healing and restoration. You could hear a pin drop in the massive auditorium the evening Pastor Lindsey Jorgensen - Skakum spoke about her 'coming out' as gay to her family. She is now an ordained pastor in the Lutheran Church and is



passionate about welcoming and including members of the LGBTQ2S+ community.

Through the generosity of our congregations in their fundraising efforts, Algoma sponsored 40 youth and adults to attend CLAY this year. Please extend my personal thanks to your congregation if you were a part of that fundraising. It was a huge amount of work to organize the youth to attend this gathering – an organization that included the safe travel and housing of the youth en route to Thunder Bay, and ensuring that they were accompanied during their time at CLAY. Greetings from the Chaplain

Greetings ACW Sisters,

As I was pondering (aloud) about what I would write about this fall in the newsletter. My son was in hearing distance, and said, "Reap what you sow." Surprised at both what he said and the fact that he heard me, I asked him to explain what he had in mind with that statement. He replied, "If you sow positivity, you will reap it. If you sow negativity, be prepared to reap that also."

That certainly started me to question about how do we get to the reaping if we have sown a crop either negative or positive. This is the time of year we celebrate Thanksgiving, bring in the crops, harvesting whatever we have gathered, made, and/or received through the grace of God. It is also the planting time in our North American continent for new beginnings: the first day of school when children and adults alike return to various types of classrooms; the first month of returning to meetings (ACW, school committees, committees in general); even elections. So-if we are about to have new seeds sown within us, let us think about God's advice about what we, in turn, must sow in our families, communities, and beyond our borders. In Paul's letter to the Ephesians he reminds of the wonderful gifts (seeds) that Christ has planted within us with the expectation they would grow and become fruitful. In chapter 4: 7,11-13 he writes:

But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift.

The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.

I have listened carefully to the many ways in which the ACW has worked to spread this message of love, life, compassion and hope within our parishes, deaneries, and diocese Books, clothing, food, money, and, yes, even milkbags :) have been generously given to help around the world. Please keep feeding the gifts Christ has bestowed upon you so that those gifts (seeds) will continue growing throughout the world. I leave you with a collect for lay ministries that sums up our will to continue our ministries,

Almighty God, by your grace alone we are accepted and called to your service.

Strengthen us by your Holy Spirit and make us worthy of our calling;

through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.


There is a time for everything and a season for every activity under the sun. Eccl 1: 3

Well here we are, Summer is over, and by the time you read this a new round of activities will have begun. I suppose we are governed by the seasons, aren't we? In some way they offer us security, it is comforting to know that eventually the cycle will come around to our favourite time of the year once again, and all is as it should be.

The writer in Ecclesiastes, (some passages in the book seem to indicate that King Solomon was the author), appears at the start to be somewhat disheartened by this endless succession, life is a meaningless cycle, there really seems no point. - II. How do we already do this and could we/I do more?
- III. Is the whole meaning of life all about God?

Let us Pray.



Greetings. How are you doing? Were the summer months good to you? How was your Church Family during the summer?

Did your parish temporarily close down for July and August or start up for the Summer months?

Were there lots of weddings, baptisms to keep those A.C.W. altar guilds so busy, their calendar was full!

Did your parish celebrate a milestone Anniversary? or welcome an amalgamation of parishes?

Were you busy with Vacation Bible School? Did your Church School (or teachers) take a vacation? or Did you have enough supply teachers to keep going throughout the summer months? Did you have Messy Church during the summer?

Did your youth participate in travelling to a camp or perhaps travel to Thunder Bay for CLAY 2018? Or did they just go on their own personal family vacations?

Was there an A.C.W. wind down meeting before vacation time? Or were you so busy planning the next event?

Was there a special opportunity to have a church Picnic, or B.B.Q.? How about a church bazaar, auction or a booth representing your church at a Community function?

Were you volunteering at a local food bank or a community garden, or a community meal? There's so much more to report on! I KNOW YOU WERE BUSY!

So much more to report ... to have had on your to do list and checked off that ... WOW! your dedication to serve all, amazes me! I know you did it! And doesn't it feel GOOD!

What is coming up for the Fall??

Our churches will soon be having Stewardship Dinners or meetings and for the upcoming start up of our busy schedules for all our committees, ... committees that give of their time and talents ... I am going to suggest to you to put a galvanized bucket on each individual table. Give each parishioner a pad of paper and pencil. Many don't wish to speak up at meetings, and probably wouldn't think of emailing or writing out their suggestion or idea. If they are given a chance to jot down one or two thoughts or ideas, ... it just might spark an idea!

Think of what you would like your parish to have on their bucket list. What would you put down and perhaps suggest how to do it? It would or could make for some interesting reading, or actually to get thinking wheels in motion.

Then we could all take the idea a step further. Try this.

Why don't we go to the hardware store (or dollar store) and purchase a galvanized bucket. Experiment with carrying this bucket around with you for a day or even a week, or two!

Carry it wherever you go. To work, to school, to the store, on the bus, everywhere. See the reaction you get. "What are you, ... a dairy farmer?", What are you going to do, pick apples? (This idea reminds me of when my daughter had to carry around a raw egg for Family Studies at high school, pretending it was a real baby. She had to think responsibly as a parent caring for her baby egg. The other teens teased her, questioned and laughed at her being responsible for this baby "Egbert"!)

This bucket can be a reminder to you to fill your day with whatever you need. Ask yourself, what can I fill this with today? Some days I know I need patience, some days I need time, oh how I need more time! If they ask, I will tell them. "I carry this bucket today to remind me I need to fill my day with ideas." Or " as I carry this empty bucket is filled with ...memories? If we fill the bucket with arguments, then we become negotiators, if we fill our bucket with criticism; we become cynics; if we fill them with joy we become exceedingly happy!

Try filling it with cookies or apples and see what response you get! M-m-m they look good! Fill your heart (or bucket) with kindness, or joy, as your hand out your apples or cookies. *Jesus teaches us, if we fill our buckets with love, we actually become love!*

People will figure out what we truly believe in as

Christians, by what we actually do. Then they will praise our Father in heaven.

Believe in the concept of the bucket.

"As I carry this empty bucket, it reminds me ... it is actually filled with everything I need. I don't need a thing, I've got it all. All of God's gifts are right in front of me! He provides my every need!

It's filled with His Love, His Grace! "

Do all the good you can. I know you can. Doesn't it feel GOOD!

Three youth from Muskoka area, Alexus, Paige, Matthew, travelled with me up to North Bay where we were joined by Johanna the North Bay Deanery, Youth Facilitator, (who I might add just finished up with a V.B.S. program at her parish) and her two youth from the area. We journeyed on to Sault Ste. Marie, and spent our first night at Holy Trinity Church, where Fran Glover welcomed us. Holy Trinity were preparing for their V.B.S. for the following week! Jay Koyle (our Algoma Shepherd) and the youth from the Soo greeted us with borrowed sleeping bags and mats, as we were unable to transport all our luggage and sleeping bags in our 7-passenger van. Later Jay entertained us with dinner at Wacky Wings. The next morning, we all set off to our destination of Thunder Bay. We arrived at St. Paul's Church, where we met with one other leader, Jen and youth of Thunder Bay! We unloaded our belongings then ...

That evening we were graciously welcomed by Ven. Deborah Kraft and her husband, at the "Kraft Cottage". Bishop Ann and Deborah provided a feast of food for the 30 plus youth and leaders. The youth welcomed the opportunity to chat and get their land legs back, after the long drive.

Thank you, Kraft family, Bishop Ann for your hospitality! A church service, a walk through the labyrinth, and a tour of Thunder Bay, was our morning agenda. Then off to Lakehead University to register, for the Clay Gathering!

CLAY stands for Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth. Youth aged 14 - 19 years of age from all across Canada! It was an exciting, busy time, mingling with, learning alongside other youth. Over 800 youth, plus 200 leaders in attendance., all experiencing, learning, singing, dancing, laughing, listening and worshipping together. A very high energy experience!

Our theme this year was THREADS - weaving our stories together!

It took many Bishops, Priests, Pastors, Lay Persons, Elders, guest speakers, volunteers, from both the Anglican and Lutheran churches, to put this whole program on under the directions of the Youth Councils and Phil.

Those Pastors, Priests, Bishops, Elders, who shared their stories, we so appreciated your honesty, gift of faith, sharing your personal life stories, that surprised us, inspired us, comforted and moved us to open up to think about, write about, and talk about our own life stories and faith. I know it was a spiritually, uplifting, learning experience where many friends were made ... honouring many shared life stories, from Elder Beatrice's own life story and the First Nation's stories, especially the "Blanket Exercise" - tells the history of the First Nations' people (a must for everyone to experience), to the many Pastor's, Bishops', Priests' stories at the Large Gathering Place, and off site at the "Garden"; to the Home Team Leaders, under the direction of Phil who guided us all, into telling our stories, and faith journeys. To the youth. The program was excellent. I learned a lot!

During the last two years the CLAY Youth National Project was for clean water. PWRDF continues to bring awareness to the global need.

The new Youth Project for 2018 - 2020 is for how we the Youth, can bring awareness to the need for affordable housing and help those dealing with homelessness, not only for our youth, but for everyone in Canada and throughout the world. During the Gathering we, 800+ youth, sent postcards off to our Prime Minister, and our local M.P. stating our youths' views on this matter. Each of us donated a new pair of socks with a note of encouragement tucked inside to whomever receives them. All the socks were being donated to Grace Place in Thunder Bay. Watch for Youth to be involved in upcoming awareness projects throughout Algoma!

It certainly was a well packed program, August 15th to 19th, from up at dawn; to dusk! Lots of hustling around from building to building, (25,000 steps a day!) I learned this from someone with a pedometer and oh those stairs! I think I counted 120 - 180 steps at a time X 4 times a day! I certainly got myself into shape!

At the end of our stay, after hugs, exchanging emails, phone numbers, laughs and tears, we were on our way back home.

Our Muskoka/North Bay teams returned once more to Holy Trinity in Sault Ste. Marie for a night. Said good bye to the Soo friends, Jay, Jane, and Fran, then Johanna and I travelled on to North Bay, with some 5 tired, sleeping youth! Thank you, Johanna, for all you did.

Most importantly, I want to thank all those Parishes for sponsoring myself and the youth, so to be able to attend CLAY 2018. Thank you!

Our next CLAY 2020 Gathering will be held in Calgary, Alberta! Yahoo!

It was a lovely evening and a lovely well-prepared and presented service, followed by a BBQ and picnic gathering.



The youth wrote these notes to the Worker Sisters of the Holy Spirit to go along with the tablets that would be used by the families and children of Haiti. This small gesture of care, is providing clean water for hundreds of children in Haiti. This was part of the PWRDF mission for 2016 - 18 for the youth, presented at CLAY 2016. I didn't attend the Annual once again this year; but, for a very good reason. Two churches died in Thunder Bay on at midnight June 3^{rd} – St Luke's and St John the Evangelist. At 00:01, Gathering Table, a Faith Com-

munity in the Anglican Church of Canada was born. It was, to say the least, a very busy time with preparations being made, weekly meetings and much consensual decision making.

Getting to this end was not an easy process. Almost five years ago, the Deanery of Thunder Bay-North Shore began going through a process which began in July 2015 called Together in Hope. The final report was published in January 2017. This report outlined the direction for the Deanery.

July 2017 saw the forming of a three-church Discernment Committee to discern the process of merging their congregations. This committee ended in January 2018 as one of the churches felt they couldn't proceed at this time.
